If we want to break down discrimination and stigma surrounding mental illnesses we need to start talking about mental health. Everyone knows a little about mental health issues but knowing the facts about mental illness can help you to educate others and reject stigmatizing stereotypes.

Mental illness is not the result of personal weakness, lack of character or poor upbringing. Understanding mental health isn't only about being able to identify symptoms and having a name for these conditions but dispelling many false ideas about mental health conditions as well. Mental illnesses are common and treatable, and help is available.

During the month of May across the U.S. Behavioral Healthcare Organizations are bringing awareness to mental health. Each year they fight stigma, provide support, educate the public and advocate for equal care. Each year, the movement grows stronger.

10 Facts about Mental Illness:

1. Approximately **1 in 5 adults** in the U.S. experiences mental illness in a given year.
2. **1.1% of adults** in the U.S. live with schizophrenia.
3. **2.6% of adults** in the U.S. live with bipolar disorder.
4. **6.9% of adults** in the U.S. had at least one major depressive episode in the past year.
5. **18.1% of adults** in the U.S. experienced an anxiety disorder such as post-traumatic stress disorder, obsessive-compulsive disorder and specific phobias.
6. An estimated **26% of homeless adults** staying in shelters live with serious mental illness.
7. Only **41% of adults** in the U.S. with a mental health condition received mental health services in the past year.
8. Serious mental illness **costs America \$193.2 billion** in lost earnings per year.
9. Suicide is the **10th leading cause of death** in the U.S. and the **2nd leading cause of death for people aged 15–24**.
10. Each day an estimated **18-22 veterans die by suicide**.

To change these statistics our community must promote acceptance and actively challenge social stereotypes. It is only through powerful words and actions that we will shift the social barriers for those living with mental illness by encouraging acceptance and understanding.




SUGAR LAND EXCHANGE DONATES \$4,000
